February Meeting

<u>15th of February at 2.00pm</u> <u>'What is Rewilding and How Does My Garden Make a Difference</u>?'.

Laura Fairs is the Rewilding Manager at Embercombe in Higher Ashton. She will give an introduction to rewilding by outlining the basic principles of rewilding and what that might look like.

She will discuss how gardens can help support a network of rewilded areas to boost wildlife populations.

There will be a brief overview of Laura's work at Embercombe, which has seen wildlife abundance bounce back on their 50 acres, with plans to bring back proxies for large grazing herbivores that are now extinct from our landscape.

Embercombe also runs courses and programmes, seeing Laura develop the UK's first indepth rewilding training programme, which teaches how to rewild land in the UK.
